# TENTH FIELD TRIP, MISSISSIPPI GEOLOGICAL SOCIETY September 24, 25, 26, 1953

The Tenth Field Trip of the Mississippi Geological Society will be held September 24, 25, and 26, 1953 in the type area of the Wilcox and Midway groups (Lower Eocene and Paleocene), west central Alabama. Field trip leaders are: Mr. P. E. LaMoreaux, Mr. E. H. Rainwater and Dr. L. D. Toulmin. A guidebook covering the general geology of the area, detailed descriptions of the exposures to be visited, and a road log will be available.

Registration will take place at the Jefferson Davis Hotel, Montgomery, Alabama, the evening of September 24th between 5:00 P.M. and 6:00 P.M. A cocktail hour and a banquet are planned for the evening and following the banquet there will be a panel discussion of the Wilcox-Midway stratigraphy of the Gulf Coast by the following experts:

Dr. L. D. Toulmin, for Alabama Mr. F. F. Mellen and Mr. E. M. Rice, for Mississippi Dr. Grover E. Murray, for Louisiana Dr. H. B. Stenzel, for Texas

Room reservations for the night of September 24th should be made directly with the Jefferson Davis Hotel, Montgomery.

Friday night, September 25th, will be spent in Selma, Alabama. Room reservations should be made to the Graystone Motel, Selma, Alabama, which will find rooms in other motels or hotels when the Graystone is full. Please mention the Mississippi Geological Society when making hotel reservations.

The Field Trip will end Saturday afternoon, September 26th at Naheola Landing about 50 miles east of Meridian, Mississippi.

Chartered air-conditioned buses will be available for the trip, leaving the Trailways Bus Station, Jackson, Mississippi at Noon, September 24th, returning to Jackson, Mississippi, Saturday afternoon, September 26th.

Those desiring to travel to Montgomery by plane may reserve seats on the chartered buses from Montgomery to Jackson, Mississippi.

Fare for the bus will be \$14.00. Reservations, including the \$14.00 fare, are to be made prior to September 15, 1953 with Claude D. Smith, c/o Union Producing Company, Box 1020, Jackson, Mississippi.



#### PRESIDENT'S COMMENTS

On November 19, 1953, your Executive Council held a conference with the Heads of the Departments of Geology from the University of Mississippi, Mississippi State, Mississippi Southern and Millsaps College. The purpose of this conference was to discuss ways and means by which the Mississippi Geological Society might assist these departments in their attempts to improve themselves and gain more favorable recognition and support from their respective Administrations.

As a result of this meeting the following program has been undertaken. An Academic Committee has been appointed consisting of the following members: A. E. Blanton, Chairman; Fred F. Mellen, Henry Toler, and W. H. Knight.

This Committee will consider two principal plans of action. Plan No. 1 will make recommendations to the Society concerning the feasibility of establishing one or more Scholarships or a Loan Fund for the benefit of deserving geology students in Mississippi. Plan No. 2 - it will, together with the above mentioned Department Heads, develop the material necessary to formulate a positive recommendation which will be used to "sell" the various College Administrations the idea that the departments must be strengthened if Mississippi is to furnish her share of well-trained geologists to the petroleum industry. It is hoped that these recommendations will be placed before the several college presidents early next year by having the entire Committee visit each campus and discuss the matter in conference.

#### CONSTITUTION AMENDMENTS

The following two amendments to the Mississippi Geological Society's 1948 Constitution are recommended by the resolution of the Constitution Committee.

1. Under Article III, Section 4, the following addition is recommended.

Amendment I to 1948 Constitution

"The Treasurer, with the approval of the President, may appoint a member of the Society to aid in discharging the duties of the office of treasurer."

2. Article V, Elections - Section I

General Elections

Present Section reads:

A. <u>Nominations</u> - Nominations for officers of the Society shall be made from the floor at the next to the last regular meeting prior to the summer recess. Two or more candidates shall be nominated for each office.

Recommended changes will read:
Amendment II to 1948 Constitution

- A. Nominating Committee A Nominating Committee composed of five (5) members shall be appointed by the Executive Council 30 days before next to the last regular meeting prior to the summer recess. No encumbent officer shall serve on this Committee. The Committee shall be discharged after presenting its slate of candidates to the Society.
- B. Nominations Nominations for officers of the Society shall be made by the Nominating Committee and a slate of candidates announced at the next to the last regular meeting prior to the summer recess. Two or more candidates shall be nominated for each office by the Committee. Additional candidates for each office may be nominated from the floor at this meeting.

The resolution will be voted on for adoption at the December 3rd meeting.

"Certain Stratigraphic Problems in the Warrior Basin" was the title of an interesting paper given by Rizer Everett, District Geologist for the Carter Oil Company, at the recent Convention of the Gulf Coast Association of Geological Societies held in Shreveport. #### GEOFFREY JEFFREYS CLAIMED BY DEATH

Geoffrey Jeffreys, charter member of the Mississippi Geological Society, and widely known petroleum geologist and engineer of Jackson, died at his home in Jackson on October 28, 1953, following an illness of several months. He was 68 years old.

Funeral services were conducted from the Wright and Ferguson chapel with interment in the Lakewood Memorial Park.

Born in Landovery, England, March 27, 1885, Mr. Jeffreys attended Wellington College and the Camborne School of Mines. He served as geologist for the Lord Cowdray Interests in Mexico from 1906 to 1911; was chief resident geologist for Carribbean Petroleum Co. (Shell Oil Co.), Caracas, Venezuela from 1913 to 1918; and was a consulting petroleum geologist in New York City and Caracas, Venezuela from 1926 to 1937. He was a member of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists.

Since 1938 he has been a resident of Jackson and was senior member of the geological consulting firm of G. Jeffreys & Son of Jackson and Pensacola Fla.

Survivors include his wife, the former Ina Littell; two sons, E. G. Jeffreys, Pensacola, Fla., and Rodney W. Jeffreys, Jackson; one brother, Charles N. T. Jeffreys, Cheltenury, England; and one sister, Miss A. C. Jeffreys, Ellesnere Sharpshire, England.



"The loan will be for a maximum of \$100.00 per regular semester, per student, and payable at the beginning of each semester.

"The maximum amount to be outstanding to the Mississippi Geological Society at any one time will be \$1,200.00.

"The loans are to be made to students of senior or graduate level, and are to be repaid not later than two years from the end of the academic term in which the loan was made.

"The academic standing of the applicant must be acceptable to the Executive Committee of the Mississippi Geological Society.

"In the event a student continues to pursue his education without interruption, the loan may be extended at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

"This program is to be administered by the Executive Committee of the Mississippi Geological Society, and the responsibility for the loans will rest with the Executive Committee after receiving recommendations from the heads of the Geology Departments of the schools involved.

"The Executive Committee will report to the Mississippi Geological Society at least once each academic term as to the development, status and progress of the student loan program."

The Society does not contemplate offering loans until the fall semester of this year. Further details and instructions to schools and applicants will be announced during the forthcoming summer.

## RESULTS OF VOTING ON PROPOSED CONSTITUTION OF G.C.A.G.S.

The Results of post-card ballots on the proposed Gulf Coast Association of Geological Societies' Constitution were 127 votes for adoption and 4 votes against adoption.

The Societies' representative advised the Steering Committee of the G.C.A.G.S. the results of the balloting at a meeting held on May 3, 1954, in New Orleans.
