

The Constitution and By-laws of the Mississippi Geological Society are being re-written to reflect the new office of Second Vice President as approved last year by the membership. Copies will be distributed to the membership shortly, when the membership lists are mailed in October.

News from Department of Geology, MSU

Dr. Karl A. Riggs will join the staff of the Department of Geology and Geography at Mississippi State University in September, 1968. Dr. Riggs, whose training is principally in mineralogy, petrology, and soil morphology, earned the B.S. and M.S. degrees from Michigan State and the Ph.D from Iowa State (1956). His professional experience includes research with Mobil, consulting in Dallas, and teaching at Western Michigan University. The addition of Dr. Riggs will bring the departmental staff to eight - six in geology, two in geography.

The department has consistently emphasized training in the geology of non-metallic resources, especially in relation to petroleum exploration. While this will continue to receive the major emphasis of the department, it is hoped that more academic and research consideration can now be given to minerals.

Throughout the past year Mississippi State University, principally through the efforts of Mr. Fred Mellen, has effected exchange of certain fossil specimens with the British Museum, and with Mr. Joe Collins, a worker in Cretaceous lepadomorph barnacles. Two shipments have been received and additional specimens are expected in the future. The fossils are principally from the Jurassic and Tertiary, and may be of interest to MGS geologists concerned with these Systems. The fossils will be added to the Dunn-Seiler Museum collection at Mississippi State.

The staff of this department would welcome a visit from any member of the MGS. Departmental quarters are in Hilburn Hall, with museum, office, and lecture rooms on second floor, and laboratories on third floor.



(1927 -- 1968)

STUDY OF JURASSIC STRATIGRAPHY PUBLISHED

The Mississippi Geological Survey has released Bulletin 109, Jurassic Stratigraphy of Mississippi. This Bulletin contains two papers, one by Theo H. Dinkins, Jr., and another by Marvin L. Oxley and others. This Bulletin is 77 pages in length and contains 22 figures and plates.

The Jurassic has become the prime objective for oil and gas exploration in Mississippi in the past few years and there was been little published information on the stratigraphy of the Jurassic in Mississippi. The two

papers in this Bulletin will add much to the knowledge of these important formations and will no doubt be helpful in the search for oil and gas in Mississippi

The opening September meeting Bar-B-Que was attended by 99 members.



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

2. Bulletin

An impending format change will save about \$30,000 per year. Backlog of articles has been cut from 18 mos. to about 8 mos.

3. Constitution Revision

A proposal is under consideration to revise the Constitution of the AAPG. The basic document, originally intended for the Southwest Geologic Society in Tulsa, has been revised in each of 35 years of the society's 52-year history. The revision is a structural reorganization only and would effect two principal changes: to upgrade the Business Committee to a House of Delegates from member Societies; and to create an Advisory Council which will provide better continuity and better control over the many committees of the Association.

Conselman presented a very persuasive appeal for a more business-like manner in controlling the affairs of the Association in order that it may better serve its members. Further information is available from your District Representatives. ERRATA - JURASSIC STRATIGRAPHY OF MISSISSIPPI - SURVEY BULLETIN 109

Well #2 on stratigraphic cross section D-D', Plate 4 (in rear pocket) is incorrectly scaled. The Pink Sandstone facies should measure 1085 feet instead of the 400 feet as printed (measure down from top of Pink Sandstone facies). The Upper Smackover is scaled 25 feet too thick and 82 feet more of lower Smackover was penetrated. The overall Jurassic section should measure 4872 feet when corrections are scaled.

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

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
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

NIGHT COURSES IN GEOLOGY AT MILLSAPS

Two night courses in geology are scheduled at Millsaps College next semester. These offerings are in keeping with the new program which will permit people in industry to, in four years, complete the basic requirements in that discipline. Both courses are open to regular Millsaps students who have scheduling difficulties.

Anyone who has completed high school is eligible to enroll in the introductory course, Geology 101, Physical Geology. Physical Geology will meet Tuesday and Thursday nights, 6 to 8. It is a combined lecture-laboratory course. Dr. J. O. Snowden, Jr., will teach. The class will meet in Sullivan-Harrell Science Hall on Millsaps campus, Room 055. The course will run from January 30, through May 31. First meeting will be Thursday, January 30.

An advanced course, Geology 201, Crystallography-Mineralogy, will be offered Monday and Wednesday nights, 6 to 8. The first meeting will be Wednesday night January 29 in Room 055 of Sullivan-Harrell Science Hall. The course will treat crystallography, lattice dimensions, symmetry, and structural chemistry of minerals. There will be introductory work in X-ray crystallography.

In the fall semester of 1969, two other courses will be offered -- Geology 102, Historical Geology, and Geology 211, Physiography. Both require basic geology as provided in Geology 101, Physical Geology.

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

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

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

JACKSON GEOPHYSICAL SOCIETY MEETING

The Jackson Geophysical Society will present Dr. Bryan L. Isacks, currently on a Distinguished Lecture Tour sponsored by the Society of Exploration Geophysicists, in a special lecture on March 19, 1969. Dr. Isacks' lecture on the subject "Seismology and the New Global Tectonics," at The Kings Inn at 5:30 P.M. will be highlighted by a discussion of the current thinking on continental drift.

Dr. Isacks, along with his colleague at Lamont, Dr. Jack Oliver, has been engaged recently in research on the hypothesis of continental drift and sea-floor spreading. Dr. Isacks has also done research in Arctic geophysics, seismic instrumentation, measurement of ground noise, earthquake mechanisms, and earthquake statistics. In 1964-65 he implemented a field program in the Tonga Island arc of the Southwest Pacific. His major interest at present is the application of seismological data to the problem of global tectonics, particularly the tectonics of island arcs.

J. A. "Jimmy" Otts, Jr., M.G.S. member from Columbia, Mississippi, died in Shreveport February 12. Burial was in Hattiesburg February 16. 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

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

Gentlemen:

I am engaged in graduate level research and am seeking your assistance. I am interested in assessing what diagenetic changes, if any, occur in bentonites.

My adviser and I feel that by analyzing, with an x-ray diffractometer, a series of bentonite samples with a varying degree of temperature and pressure control, we can trace these changes. Temperature and pressure are controlled for single units here in the Gulf Coastal Region. We are considering the Upper Cook Mountain units for our study.

One of the most critical points in this study is obtaining bentonite samples from the subsurfaces. A further complication lies in the fact that since we would expect contamination from drilling muds, oil well cuttings will not suffice. Cores seem to be the only answer.

I would be grateful for any information you could give me as to where I can obtain cores for the Upper Cook Mountain bentonite to an ultimate depth of 5,000-10,000 feet.
