

"What's Going on in the Hosston Trend
in Mississippi"

Abstract

Since the discovery of commercial gas and condensate from deeper Hosston sands below 15,000 feet at Bassfield Field in 1974, the exploration effort seeking other similar reservoirs in the Hosston Trend in South Mississippi continues to grow and other new successes continue to make this province one of the most attractive basins of the lower 48 states.

From 1951 through 1970, a 20 year span, a total of 30 new fields were discovered from Sligo/Hosston reservoirs; 28 being oil and 2 being gas. However, in the last 10 years, from 1971 through 1979, in half the time, 33 new fields were discovered, of which 28 are gas and 5 are oil. The striking relationship of more recent gas discoveries rather than oil discoveries is significant.

The increase in exploration activity for gas reservoirs was brought on by three major factors - the critical national energy shortage, the favorable success of finding commercial gas below 15,000 feet and the continued increase in the value of an MCF of gas, which skyrocketed from 15-20 cents per MCF prior to the early seventies to more than \$5 per MCF in recent months.

The top 1000 feet of the Hosston formation comprise a series of very fine grained tight sandstones. The most favorable objective is the Booth sand found about 600 feet below the top of the Hosston formation, however, other sands above and below this sand have recently been proven to be equally favorable in distribution and thickness, as well as productivity.

Productive Hosston sands have a porosity range from 7 to 15%; permeability ranges from 0 to 1000 millidarcies and although occasionally may be higher, generally averages in the low hundreds.

Many of the fields produce formation water along with gas and condensate having 100,000 to 160,000 ppm chlorides; water yields vary from less than 1 bbl./MMCFG to 115 bbl./MMCFG. Condensate yields vary from less than 1 bbl./MMCFG to 80 bbl./MMCFG. Productive sand thickness varies from 5 feet to 70 feet. Commercial production depends more on sufficient permeability than net thickness of pay.

Flow rates in some of the better fields have sustained production of more than 4 MMCFG per day per well.

Recoverable reserves per 640 acre unit for an average Hosston reservoir having 20 feet effective pay will vary between 5-9 BCFG and 100-200 MBC.

As long as operators continue to find new fields of this magnitude, the efforts will continue to escalate and indications are that the future still looks encouraging for many more years to come. We have only begun to "scratch the surface".

Donald Roy Scherer received his B.S. degree in Geology from Tulane University in 1949. He worked with Gulf from 1949 - 1952 in New Orleans, Southern Natural Gas from 1952 - 1976 as geologist, District Geologist in Jackson and Exploitation Geologist and later District Geologist in Houston. Don later worked with Texas Crude Inc. from June 1976 - March 1979 as District Geologist - Southeastern States. He currently is with Weaver Oil & Gas Corporation as Division Geological Manager.

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

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
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NO. 1 PLAY IN THE U.S.A.
SOUTH LOUISIANA TUSCALOOSA TREND
1975 - 1980

ABSTRACT

Since the discovery of Tuscaloosa production at False River field in West Baton Rouge Parish, Louisiana on May 31, 1975, the Tuscaloosa trend of south central Louisiana has developed into the most active deep exploratory play in the U.S.A. Drilling activity since the discovery of the False River field has resulted in the additional discovery of thirteen Tuscaloosa gas-condensate fields, one Tuscaloosa oil field, three Austin Chalk discoveries, and one Wilcox discovery. As of March 1980, two hundred forty-one permits have been issued by the Louisiana Department of Conservation. Of this number, one hundred nineteen are wildcats which have been drilled or are drilling below a depth of 15,000 ft. The success ratio for wildcats is one of six, or sixteen and two-thirds percent and field extension and development drilling has resulted in a success ratio of one of two, or fifty percent.

There are in excess of four million acres under lease in the trend. One hundred twenty-nine thousand, six hundred eighty acres have been placed in Tuscaloosa drilling units by the Louisiana Department of Conservation. Some of the most significant fields discovered along the trend are the False River field, West Baton Rouge Parish; the Moncrief, Judge Digby, and Moore-Sams fields in Pointe Coupee Parish; the Port Hudson, Irene and Profit Island fields in East Baton Rouge Parish; and the Lockhart Crossing field in Livingston Parish, Louisiana. Proven reserves of four trillion cubic feet of gas and four hundred million barrels of condensate have been established. In addition, available seismic and subsurface data indicate the

future reserve potential of the Tuscaloosa to be estimated at sixteen trillion cubic feet of gas.

A detailed subsurface and stratigraphic study of the existing fields to date should serve as a guide for locating other major reserves along the trend.

VITA

Joe B. Adams is with the Louisiana Office of Conservation. He attended Louisiana State University, receiving a B. S. in geology in 1956. He served two years as Unit Commander in the Corps of Engineers, then with the construction industry from 1958-63. He was with the State of Louisiana Mineral Board from 1963 to 1975, serving as District Geologist. In February, 1975, he was transferred to the Office of Conservation where he is presently Senior Offshore Geologist with primary responsibility for state-owned coastal waters. Joe has followed the South Louisiana Tuscaloosa Trend since its discovery.

Frank W. Harrison, a consulting geologist in Lafayette, Louisiana, received a BS in Petroleum Geology from L.S.U. in 1950. He worked as geologist for Union Producing Company from 1950-54, was in the U.S. Army from 1951-53. He was with Seaboard Oil until 1956, Trans-Texas Drilling Company as District Geologist until 1957, head geologist with American Natural Gas from 1957-59 and has been an independent and consulting geologist since 1959.

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
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



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REGIONAL STRATIGRAPHY OF UPPER JURASSIC SMACKOVER
CARBONATES OF SOUTHWEST ALABAMA

Ernest A. Mancini and D. Joe Benson

ABSTRACT

Upper Jurassic Smackover deposition in southwest Alabama was primarily controlled by the Mississippi interior salt basin and the Manila and Conecuh embayments and closely approximated carbonate sedimentation in the present-day Persian Gulf. These depositional sites are characterized by distinctive lithofacies and fossil assemblages. Early salt movement produced local variations in carbonate sediment distribution and pre-Jurassic paleo-highs, such as the Wiggins uplift and Conecuh arch, also modified carbonate sedimentation.

Throughout much of southwest Alabama, the Smackover Formation consists of a lower predominately mudstone lithofacies which overlies the Norphlet sandstone and an upper lithofacies sequence dominated by grain-supported textures which is overlain by the Buckner anhydrite. Where present, the lower Smackover lithofacies include laminated mudstone and on occasion peloidal wackestone, peloidal-oncolitic packstone, or dolomite are present. The upper lithofacies sequence consists of oolitic and/or oncolitic grainstone, peloidal and/or oncolitic wackestones to packstone, and occasionally dolomite or mudstone.

Petroleum traps in southwest Alabama are principally combination traps involving favorable stratigraphy and salt anticlines, faulted salt anticlines, or extensional faults associated with salt movement. Reservoir rocks include grainstones; leached and dolomitized wackestones, packstones, and grainstones; and dolomite. Porosity is facies-selective and is developed chiefly in lithofacies of the upper Smackover.

Porosity includes primary interparticulate, secondary grain moldic, intercrystalline dolomite, vuggy, and fracture. The algal mudstones that characterize the lower Smackover and are interbedded with upper Smackover lithologies throughout most of southwest Alabama make excellent petroleum source rocks.

The flanks of the Wiggins-Conecuh ridge and updip Smackover grainstones associated with salt structures are excellent areas for petroleum exploration in southwest Alabama. The key to successful prospecting is the delineation of traps associated with salt movement and recognition of either high to moderate energy lithofacies that have had their primary interparticulate porosity preserved or of lithofacies that have been dolomitized and/or leached with the development of intercrystalline dolomite and/or secondary grain moldic porosity.

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

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

MONTEAGLE LIMESTONE (UPPER MISSISSIPPIAN)
OOLITIC TIDAL-BAR SEDIMENTATION IN
SOUTHERN CUMBERLAND PLATEAU

ABSTRACT: Most of the thick clastic strata of Carboniferous age in the Black Warrior basin in Alabama were deposited in various subenvironments of a northeast-prograding deltaic complex. Farther offshore and toward the north, Upper Mississippi carbonate sediments were deposited in banks and shoals. The Monteagle Limestone is considered to have been deposited contemporaneously with part of this prograding clastic sequence; it grades southwest over a distance of 30 km or less to the Pride Mountain Formation and Floyd Shale. Six lithofacies can be recognized within the Monteagle Limestone: (1) massive to lenticular bedded, echinoderm-bryozoan packstone-grainstone; (2) cross-bedded oolitic packstone-grainstone; (3) laminated to structureless dolomitic mudstone; (4) lime wackestone-mudstone; (5) pellet wackestone-grainstone; (6) clayey shale. The sequence of facies and their sedimentary structures record the initial buildup and migration of an oolitic tidal bar into a relatively low-energy environment culminating in the emergence of the bar above sea level where tidal-flat sedimentation, dolomitization, and calichification occurred.

Isolith data suggest that oolitic sand was concentrated in a belt along a line trending northeast-southwest in northeastern Alabama and Tennessee. This belt was composed of individual tidal bars, also oriented northeast-southwest. Initially, each bar was influenced directly by either ebb (northeast) or flood (southwest) tidal currents creating basal sets of cross-strata oriented unidirectionally to correspond with flood or ebb flow current directions. With growth and expansion, each tidal bar came under the increasing influence of the weaker reverse current which resulted in the reversal of paleocurrent azimuths at the top of the bar.

VITA

Dr. Handford graduated from Northern Louisiana University with a bachelor's degree in 1967. He completed the master's program at the University of Arkansas in 1969, and obtained his doctorate from Louisiana State University in 1976.

Upon completion of his dissertation, he moved to California to work at Union Oil of California's Research Center in Brea. After a year in Brea Dr. Handford spent three years with the Bureau of Economic Geology in Austin, Texas. Since September he has been with the Louisiana Geological Survey in Baton Rouge.

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
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

JURASSIC GEOLOGY AND HYDROCARBON POTENTIAL OF
SOUTHWESTERN ALABAMA

RAYMOND P. KARPOVICH

ABSTRACT

The Jurassic Haynesville-Buckner-Smackover-Norphlet sequence in southwestern Alabama includes excellent deep reservoirs and laterally equivalent source rocks. The complex interaction of stratigraphy, syndepositional salt tectonics and faulting, and draping due to differential compaction over basement structures provides mechanism for early entrapment of and potentially significant hydrocarbon reserves in this area. Major Smackover-Norphlet production to the northwest and northeast, at Hatters Pond, Chunchula and Jay fields, is from facies similar to those found in southwestern Baldwin County, Alabama. Detailed petrographic analyses of cores, chips, and cuttings samples from seven wells in southern Alabama and western Florida provide data for conceptualizing Upper Jurassic stratigraphy (Norphlet-lower Haynesville) and paleofacies relationships in this area.

The development of a regional Triassic Eagle Mills paleotopography in this area, including the interior salt basin, was influenced by existing Paleozoic basement structural trends and tensional tectonism related to incipient opening of the ancestral Gulf of Mexico. In the eastermost portion of the salt basin, deposition of the Werner Anhydrite and Louann Salt was succeeded by the southward progradation of fluvial lower Norphlet facies. Upper Norphlet facies include littoral and possibly eolian sandstones, which are among the oldest Jurassic hydrocarbon reservoirs in the region. Rapid inundation of the Norphlet surface in lower Smackover time resulted in the deposition of

"basinal" argillaceous carbonates (brown dense facies) in the area. This event was followed by the establishment and progressive southward progradation of a shoal-water limestone facies mosaic, including high-energy grainstones. Many of these subsequently dolomitized grainstones have porosities of as much as 24% and good permeabilities despite their burial below 19,000 feet in southern Baldwin County. However, commercial hydrocarbon production from such reservoirs has not yet been extended south into this area.

Evaporitic sabkha facies of the uppermost Smackover and Buckner-lower Haynesville subsequently prograded over shelf carbonates throughout most of the study area. Whereas the area south of the Baldwin County graben generally appears to have remained basinal in character throughout all of Smackover time, Buckner-lower Haynesville deposits in the Amoco No. 2 Amos well in T-7-S R-4-E Sec. 32 include thick grainstone shoal deposits which indicate the local existence of an emerging positive area south of the graben. This facies could provide for significant stratigraphic-structural hydrocarbon accumulations in this heretofore unexplored region.

VITA

Mr. Karpovich received his bachelor's degree in Geology from the University of Cincinnati in 1967. He completed his post-graduate work three years later at Florida State. A native Pennsylvanian Mr. Karpovich is currently Division Geologist with American Petrofina. Before joining Petrofina, he served with Union Texas in Lafayette, General Crude in New Orleans, and Amoco in New Orleans. Raymond is active in many professional societies and among his publication credits is the Handbook of Deltaic Sand Bodies.

ABSTRACT

There are many old logs in our well files. Often the only log available in a critical area has an SP curve and one to three non-focused resistivity curves. Knowledge of the borehole environmental effects of the electrode configuration and spacing on the old logs may lead to the discovery of overlooked hydrocarbons.

AAPG NEWS

TULSA, OKLA. - Most of the oil and gas produced in the world is found in sedimentary basins - depressed, bowl-shaped areas often covering thousands of square miles, and formed over millions of years by the deposition of organic and inorganic particles.

"Sedimentary Basins of the World and Giant Hydrocarbon Accumulations," is the only map of its kind and is now available from the American Association of Petroleum Geologists.

The map took five years to complete and was developed by Dr. Bill St. John, president of AgriPetco, a Tulsa-based international oil and gas exploration and production company. St. John is also the author of the accompanying text.

A wealth of information has been compiled in the map and text, including definitions and interesting facts. For example, of the world's 575 known sedimentary basins, 215 are oil and/or gas productive and 360 are nonproductive--either through lack of previous exploration or by having noneconomic oil and gas accumulations.

Other points of interest are what comprises giant and supergiant oil and gas fields: A giant oil field has recoverable oil reserves of at least 500 million barrels; a giant gas field contains at least 3 trillion cubic feet (Tcf) of recoverable gas. A combination giant oil and gas field with recoverable reserves of 1 billion barrels of oil and 3 Tcf of gas will have 1.5 billion barrels of oil equivalent (BOE). A supergiant field has recoverable oil reserves of at least 4 billion barrels. A supergiant gas field will have at least 24 Tcf of gas, or 4 billion BOE.

The map gives a geographical location for each of the world's basins, and identifies those that are productive from giant and subgiant fields, those that produce from subgiant fields

PETROLEUM GEOLOGY OF ALABAMA

Conference

The Alabama Geological Society, the Geological Survey of Alabama and State Oil and Gas Board of Alabama, and the School of Mines and Energy Development, The University of Alabama will host a Conference on the Petroleum Geology of Alabama, to be held at The University of Alabama on April 28-29, 1981. The Conference will concentrate on petroleum activity and future hydrocarbon potential in Alabama.

The Conference schedule includes two pre-Conference one-day field trips on April 27, 1981: to the Appalachian Thrust Belt, and to the Alabama Coastal Plain. The Thrust Belt field trip will focus on structural styles and on Paleozoic strata that are characteristic of this province. The Coastal Plain field trip will study classic Lower Tertiary and Upper Cretaceous localities of the eastern Gulf Coastal Plain. A post-Conference one-day field trip will be conducted on April 30, 1981, to the Black Warrior Basin. The Warrior Basin field trip will examine surface exposures of Carboniferous units which are productive in the subsurface.

The Conference program includes a General Session, Coastal Plain Session, Black Warrior Basin Session, Appalachian Thrust Belt Session and Core Workshop. The General Session consists of discussions of oil and gas and alternate hydrocarbon energy sources in Alabama. The Coastal Plain Session will concentrate on producing horizons, including Jurassic Norphlet sandstone and Smackover carbonate, Cretaceous Donovan, Tuscaloosa, Eutaw sandstones and Selma chalk, and Miocene sand. The Black Warrior Basin Session will focus on environments of deposition of Carboniferous producing reservoirs and regional geology of lower Paleozoic strata. The Appalachian Thrust Belt Session will examine the structural and stratigraphic complexities that an exploration geologist must deal with when prospecting in a thrust belt province. The Core Workshop affords the opportunity to study representative cores of the major producing reservoirs in Alabama, including the Norphlet, Smackover and Tuscaloosa from the Coastal Plain and Lewis and Carter from the Black Warrior Basin.

The Conference program, field trips, and core workshop provide an excellent opportunity for petroleum geologists to become familiar with Alabama surface and subsurface geology, the characteristics of the various petroleum provinces of Alabama and their respective producing horizons, and the future petroleum potential of the state. 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

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STRUCTURAL EVALUATION OF SELECTED AREAS
IN MISSISSIPPI UTILIZING LANDSAT IMAGERY

Tsean-Shu-P. Lee and Velon H. Minshev

Mississippi Mineral Resource Institute

ABSTRACT

This study was initiated by the Mississippi Mineral Resource Institute (MMRI) to evaluate the application of remote sensing technology to structurally complex, poorly understood areas. A study area composed of the Mississippi coastal zone and portions of the Mississippi Salt Embayment was chosen because it exhibits restricted geological and structural control, subsurface information is incomplete and structurally the area is of great interest to petroleum explorationists. Many of the numerous salt domes, complex fault systems, and other structural features which characterize the area have been documented; however, prior to the study, no detailed structural mapping of the area has been done.

Density slicing techniques were used to visually interpret structural features from unenhanced landsat positive film transparancies. Interpreted lineaments and other features were mapped at 1 to 250,000, 1-125,000, and 1 - 62,500 scales and manually transferred to base maps. Structural overlays were then prepared for use with topographic quadrangle and subsurface maps. These interpreted lineaments and other anomalies were then compared to known structural information of area derived from more traditional methodologies.

Based on this comparison, most of the known salt domes and other anomalies and many known faults or portions of these faults can be identified on landsat imagery. Where other types of

data are available, they should be used to enhance and verify landsat image interpretations. If, however, such data are not available, analysis of landsat imagery can, of itself, provide valuable insights into regional tectonic patterns.

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



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SEISMIC STRATIGRAPHY SYMPOSIUM

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

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

THE DETERMINATION OF POROSITY IN SANDSTONES
AND SHALY SANDSTONES

By
J. G. Patchett and E. B. Coalson

ABSTRACT

The complex mineralogy of some sandstones and shaly sandstones can make the accurate determination of porosity from logs difficult, if not impossible. The solution of this problem can require either petrophysical data often not available or logging measurements that are not developed or at least not routinely currently available. Petrophysical data obtained from cores are subject to errors in measurements and sampling. Even in quartz sandstones, systematic errors in logging measurements can make consistently reliable porosity calculations impossible without careful verification of log response. As an example, significant errors are present in a large minority of density logs.

This report includes examples, obtained during field studies, of the results of log quality surveillance. In some of these investigations, porosity measured from cores was also seriously in error, making the verification of the quality control effort difficult.


