

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

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

The Conference will be held November 29 through December 2, 1981 in Dallas, Texas at the Marriott Hotel Market Center.

# UPPER JURASSIC REEFS OF THE SMACKOVER FORMATION

Coral, sponge, and algal reefs are recognized in conventional cores of the Smackover Formation from southwestern Arkansas eastward into the panhandle of Florida. While no known reef is currently productive, attractive porosities and permeabilities (mean  $\theta$  of 20%, mean  $K$  of 500 md) result from fresh-water leaching, fracturing, or dolomitization. In addition, the reefs may have provided a positive structural aspect during later Smackover deposition and diagenesis.

Smackover reefs formed in the upper Jurassic during periods of maximum marine transgression (good circulation, clear water, normal marine salinity) in variable paleogeographic settings: (1) the seaward edges of upthrown fault blocks, i.e., Hico Knowles and Haynesville Fields, Louisiana, and Walker Creek Field, Arkansas; (2) the margins of Paleozoic highs protruding into the Smackover basin, i.e., Melvin and Vocation Fields, Alabama; and (3) the crests of early-moving salt structures, i.e., wildcat wells in Alabama. The buildups are 3 to 40 meters thick and generally cover an area of less than one square kilometer.

Smackover reefs in Alabama and Florida were constructed by algae and sponges. Vertical relief on the reef surface during growth may have been only one meter. Similar reefs in southern Arkansas and northern Louisiana exhibit a vertical zonation suggesting that the reef environment became better established. These buildups are algal boundstones containing scattered corals toward the base; diversity increases upward with the addition of abundant corals (*Actinastrea*, *Complexastrea*, *Thamnastrea*, and others), sponges, stromatoporoids, and bryozoans. The reefs are commonly underlain and overlain by peloidal lime packstones containing oncrites and scattered fossils.

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
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

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## Depositional Environment of Jurassic Smackover Sandstones, Thomasville Field, Rankin County, Mississippi

Smackover sandstones in Thomasville Field, Rankin County, Mississippi, represent turbidite channel deposits. These sandstones are interbedded with a few thin beds of oolitic grainstones. 969 feet (296 m) of core from three wells were examined, of which 820 feet (252 m) were sandstone. Depths ranged from 20,100 to 20,649 feet (6131 to 6298 m). Electric logs and cores from three wells show abrupt facies changes which may be expected from a shifting channel deposition. Correlations were made between wells and labeled the lower, upper, and anhydrite zones.

Environment of deposition was determined from an examination of core composition, texture, and sedimentary structures. Thick, massive and massive to laminated bedsets (A and AB units, respectively) are common in all cores, although massive (A) units dominate. Quartz grain sizes fine upwards in most bedsets. Sandstones have a mean grain size of 0.23 mm (fine grained). Carbonates exhibit similar textural trends and sedimentary structures. Mean size of oolites is 0.38 mm (medium sand), and they also fine upward with beds. Calcite and dolomite cements make up a average 23% of the rock.

Porosity and permeability differ between sandstones and carbonates, averaging 5.1% and 0.32 md for sandstone and averaging 1.2% and 0.01 md for carbonates. A black, opaque residue, ubiquitous throughout the cores, represents the remains of a paleo oil pool. Heat and burial cracked the oil, leaving a residue of pyrobitumen and heavy oil.

A plot of resistivity versus bulk density shows distinct groups for each rock type. A plot of resistivity versus porosity suggests a gas-water contact further down the section at a depth of about 20,500 feet (6253 m). Based on this study, the gas column is on the order of 300 feet (92 m) for about 50% water saturation.

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

## PROPOSED BYLAWS CHANGE

The current bylaws of the Society allow persons studying geology to become associate members in the Society without clearly defining what it means to "study geology". This has led to considerable misunderstanding, both on the part of the general membership and those students applying for membership. This problem has been magnified by numerous member complaints about the number of students attending the semi-annual barbecue, and their qualifications for membership. Therefore, the executive committee proposes a change in the bylaws which would clearly limit membership to bonafide geology students, as opposed to those who have merely taken a few geology courses.

### Current Bylaws: ARTICLE III-MEMBERSHIP

Section III: Any person shall be eligible to associate membership who is actively engaged in geological or related work or the study of geology.

### Proposed Change: ARTICLE III-MEMBERSHIP

Section III: Any person shall be eligible to associate membership who is actively engaged in geological or related work. Junior, senior, and graduate level geology students in a recognized university or college shall also be eligible to associate membership.

# PETROLEUM GEOLOGY OF SOUTH CARLTON FIELD, LOWER TUSCALOOSA "PILOT SAND", CLARKE AND BALDWIN COUNTIES, ALABAMA

Petroleum production from South Carlton field, southern Clarke and northern Baldwin Counties, Alabama, is primarily from the lower Tuscaloosa "Pilot Sand" of Late Cretaceous age. The "Pilot" is a massive, green-brown, micaceous, fossiliferous, glauconitic, very fine to medium-grained, quartzose sandstone. Texturally, the sandstone is submature with the quartz grains being subangular to subrounded and moderately to moderately well sorted. The sand body displays a decrease in grain size, sorting, and roundness from the base to the top of the unit. The sandstone has a maximum thickness of 71 feet in the northern part of the field. Usually overlying the "Pilot" is a gray, silty, oyster-bearing packstone. The packstone is overlain by the "Marine Shale" which consists of dark-gray, silty, micaceous, fossiliferous, laminated claystone. This claystone contains a diverse fossil assemblage, indicating open marine-shelf sedimentation. The "Pilot Sand" is underlain by an interbedded sandstone and claystone interval, which is separated from the "Massive Sand" by a silty claystone.

The spontaneous-potential pattern for the "Pilot Sand" illustrates a gradational lower contact and a sharp upper contact. Constructed cross sections indicate the "Pilot" thins and becomes argillaceous immediately east and west of the field. The sedimentary rock characteristics, including an elongate northeast to southwest strike-trending morphology, and well-log properties of the sandstone suggest it accumulated as part of a marine-bar complex.

Porosity in the "Pilot" is principally intergranular and averages 27.3 percent. Average permeability is 183 md, and oil saturation can be as much as 42 percent. The "Marine Shale" above the "Pilot Sand" and claystone from the interbedded interval underlying the "Pilot" have potential as petroleum source rocks. The overlying packstone and "Marine Shale" make excellent seal rocks. The petroleum trap is a combination of stratigraphy and structure. The structural element is most critical and involves salt movement which has resulted in a domal feature. The crude oil trapped by the salt dome is a heavy oil having a chemical composition of an immature oil.



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

### --NOTICE-- Proposed Oil & Gas Severance Tax Increase

Charlie Williams calls our attention to an issue of vital concern to all of us in Mississippi's Oil & Gas Industry. The Governor is recommending that the 1982 Legislature increase the Oil and Gas Severance Tax rate from 6% of value to 10% to provide funding for Kindergarten and Compulsory Education Programs. That's a 67% increase on our industry which is already making a substantial contribution to our State's economy through Risk Capital, Investments, Jobs, and Taxes. Our industry has been one of the few bright spots in Mississippi during these uncertain times...drilling is up, oil related employment is up, and our production taxes are the only major revenue source that has been significantly increasing in our State. Our Industry has always supported better education and fully recognizes its importance to the future of the State. Increasing the severance tax, however, will affect Mississippi's ability to compete with other states for drilling dollars thereby dampening future exploration and production activities. # **Waveland Field: An Analyses of Facies, Diagenesis, and Hydrodynamics in the Mooringsport Reservoirs**

Although Waveland field was discovered in 1965, only in the last few years has development changed this once insignificant field into a 24,000-acre producing area flowing nearly 4 billion cubic feet of gas per month. Part of the reason for the field's unusual growth rate is found in a host of reservoir disguises related to carbonate facies, diagenesis, and fracturing.

All of the field wells to date have penetrated a uniform sequence of back-reef and lagoonal deposits in the Mooringsport (Lower Albian) producing interval. Miliolid and pellet packstones, mollusk and echinoid mudstones, and orbitolinid packstones and grainstones make up this sequence. The producible reservoir beds are curiously correlative only to the orbitolinid facies, despite the fact that log analyses and standard core analyses do not discriminate between facies with regard to reservoir properties.

Petrographic studies and special core analyses have identified a unique style of diagenetic recrystallization which yields water-free gas production from these high water saturation reservoirs. However, in updip portions of the field where porosity and permeability have been enhanced by solution diagenesis, both gas and water are produced in subeconomical proportions.

The complex association of a discretely layered reservoir, which demonstrates untraditional fluid dynamics within layers, is further complicated by a dual system of vertical fractures. This fracture system, which is probably a function of gulfward subsidence coincident with drape across the Hancock ridge, has been demonstrated to be an important factor controlling the prolonged and prolific production at Waveland field.

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

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

Hydrocarbons occur in the subsurface in four modes: (1) continuous phase oil or gas; (2) isolated droplets of oil or gas; (3) dissolved hydrocarbons; and, (4) hydrocarbons associated with kerogenous rocks. All of these modes of occurrence can result in what is described as a subsurface hydrocarbon "show". Each show type has strongly different implications to exploration and must be differentiated as the first step in show interpretation. Only continuous phase occurrences of oil and gas indicate that a trapped and potentially producible accumulation of hydrocarbons has been discovered. Free oil or gas recovery from the formation or subsurface hydrocarbon saturations of greater than 50% indicates a continuous phase occurrence.

Continuous phase shows can be interpreted quantitatively. The static hydrocarbon column downdip from a continuous phase occurrence can be calculated from one well bore if the subsurface oil or gas saturation, capillary properties, hydrocarbon-water interfacial tension, oil density, and water density of the reservoir are known. Producing wells are by definition continuous phase oil or gas, and estimates of oil-water or gas-water contacts from this type analysis can be useful in orderly and profitable field development.

Continuous phase oil or gas can extend either updip or downdip from a commercial reservoir. These continuous phase shows can also be interpreted quantitatively to determine how large an oil or gas column is required downdip to explain the show. By this method it can be determined whether an exploratory well penetrated the updip waste zone or downdip transition zone of an oil or gas field. Field studies indicate quantitative show interpretation of a non-commercial show can provide reliable estimates of the downdip hydrocarbon column. This type of data can be used in a systematic manner to explore for subtle stratigraphic and combination traps.

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## A.A.P.G. The Division of Professional Affairs

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## **BYLAWS of the Mississippi Geological Society, Inc.**

Most organizations periodically furnish their members with a copy of the organizational structure. As a service to the MGS membership, the society's current BYLAWS are included in this issue of the Bulletin.

### **THE MISSISSIPPI GEOLOGICAL SOCIETY, INC.**

#### **ARTICLE I—NAME AND AFFILIATION**

The name of the Society shall be "The Mississippi Geological Society, Inc." It shall be affiliated with the American Association of Petroleum Geologists.

#### **ARTICLE II—OBJECTS**

The objects of this Society are: (1) the stimulation of interest in geology and related sciences; (2) the encouragement of scientific research among members; (3) the promotion of social and professional fellowship among members; (4) the dissemination and discussion of geological information; and (5) the Society shall not be operated for profit and no financial benefits of any nature shall ever accrue to the members thereof.

#### **ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP**

Section I: The membership of this organization shall be made up of active members, associate members, and honorary members.

Section II: In order to be eligible for active membership, an applicant shall: (1) have a degree in geology or an allied science from a recognized college or university and shall be directly engaged in the application of geology, or shall (2) have been primarily engaged in geological work during at least the preceding five years. These requirements shall not apply to any member if he were a charter member of the Society as reflected by the June 16, 1940, membership list.

Section III: Any person shall be eligible to associate membership who is actively engaged in geological or related work. Junior, senior, and graduate level geology students in a recognized university or college shall also be eligible to associate membership. Associate members shall not be eligible to hold elective office or to sponsor applicants for active or associate membership, but shall have all other rights and privileges enjoyed by active members. If an associate member attains eligibility for active membership, he may apply for a transfer to active membership.

Section IV: Honorary Members—The Board of Directors may from time to time elect by unanimous vote of the Board as honorary members of the Mississippi Geological Society Inc., persons who are present or past members that have contributed distinguished services to the Society. It is not intended nor desirable that there should be a large or promiscuous number of such members, but that it should be

considered an honor to receive from the Society an honorary membership as a token award in appreciation and esteem for meritorious services. Honorary members shall not be required to pay dues and may enjoy all privileges of the Society.

Section V: Any member may be suspended or dropped from the membership of the Society for misconduct or actions harmful to the Society, action to be taken at the discretion of the Board of Directors by a majority vote of the Board. Such charges shall be made in writing to the member, who may protest such charges within 30 days from the date which they were mailed. After the 30 days have expired, the Board of Directors may expel such member by a majority vote of the Board. The member may resign before the end of the 30 days, at which time the foregoing proceedings shall automatically terminate.

#### ARTICLE IV—OFFICERS AND BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section I: Officers shall be a President, a First Vice President, a Second Vice President, a Treasurer and a Secretary. These, together with the Past President shall constitute the Board of Directors. If the Past President for any reason shall be unable to serve as a member of the Board of Directors the President shall fill the vacancy by the appointment of the next available preceding Past President. No officer shall succeed himself in office, with the exception of the First Vice President who after having succeeded to the Presidency due to a vacancy in that office may upon election serve a full term as President.

Section II: The duties of the President shall be to preside at all meetings, maintain order, call special meetings subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, appoint all committees, and shall delegate members to represent the Society. He may at his option serve on any committee. He shall, together with the Treasurer, sign all checks, drafts, contracts, and all other obligations of the Society. In the temporary absence of any other officer of the Society, he shall have the power to appoint a member to assume the duties pro tempore.

Section III (a): The First Vice President shall assume the office of the President in case of a vacancy from any cause in that office, and shall assume the duties of the President in case of the absence or disability of the latter. He shall be at the disposal of the President for any duty necessary to the proper functioning of the Society.

(b): The Second Vice President shall be responsible for the maintenance and supervision of the various publications of the Society, and he shall organize the necessary committees to properly administer the care, maintenance and revision of the publications necessary to providing current information on various subjects of geologic interest and the keeping of records.

Section IV: The Treasurer shall assume the duties of the President in case of the temporary absence of both the President and First Vice President. He, together with the President, shall have charge of the financial affairs of the Society. He shall submit an annual report and inventory at the last meeting before the summer recess, and any other special reports upon the request of the President. He shall receive and disburse all monies; however, expenditures in excess of one hundred dollars shall be

made only with the approval of the Board of Directors. During the month of August, the Treasurer shall send statements or notices of dues to all members, except honorary members.

Section V: The Secretary shall assume the duties of the President in case of the temporary absence of all the other officers, except the Second Vice President. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to fully and permanently record the minutes of all the meetings of the Society and all meetings of the Board of Directors. He shall prepare and distribute by mail not later than October 15, a membership list and a list of committee assignments. It shall be his duty to prepare and keep in his possession at every meeting a copy of the Bylaws with all amendments thereto. He shall be responsible for all secretarial duties connected with affairs of the Society. He shall prepare all ballots and papers necessary to any Society election.

Section VI: In addition to their other duties, the Board of Directors shall make or cause to be made an annual check and review of the Society's records prior to the last meeting of the year.

## ARTICLE V—ELECTIONS

### Section I: General Elections

A. Nominating Committee. A Nominating Committee composed of five (5) members shall be appointed by the Board of Directors 30 days before the first regular meeting in April. No incumbent officer shall serve on this Committee. The Committee shall be discharged after presenting its slate of candidates to the Society.

B. Nominations. Nominations for officers of the Society shall be made by the Nominating Committee and a slate of candidates announced at the first regular meeting in April. Two or more candidates shall be nominated for each office by the Committee. Additional candidates for each office may be nominated from the floor at this meeting or at least the last regular meeting in April. A biographical sketch of each candidate shall be published and mailed to each member of the Society at least two weeks prior to the election, or given verbally at the regular meeting just prior to the election.

C. Voting. Election of officers shall be held each year at the last regular meeting of the Society before the summer recess. Voting shall be conducted by secret ballots prepared in advance by the Secretary. A majority vote of the members present and voting shall decide the election. In case no candidate receives a majority vote on the first ballot, the candidate with the least number of votes shall be stricken from the ballot and another poll taken. This procedure shall be continued until a candidate receives a majority vote. Any member who cannot be present at the election meeting may upon request obtain an absentee ballot from the Secretary of the Society. The Secretary shall deliver all sealed ballots to the Election Judges at the election meeting. Only paid-up members and Honorary Members shall be eligible to vote in any election.

Section III: Election Judges. Prior to the balloting at any election, the President shall appoint three Election Judges from the membership who are not incumbent

officers or candidates for any office of the Society. These Judges are charged with the secret counting of the ballots and announcing the names of those elected. Election Judges will be appointed for each election.

#### ARTICLE VI—BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors, in addition to its duties specified in the Constitution, shall meet at least monthly throughout the entire calendar year and shall be the governing body of the Society. A quorum of this Board shall consist of four members. To conduct business, a majority vote of those present is necessary.

#### ARTICLE VII—STANDING COMMITTEES

As soon as practicable taking office the President shall appoint the Chairman of seven standing committees and after consultation with these Chairmen shall appoint the Committee Membership. These committees shall be as follows:

- A. A.A.P.G. Committee
- B. Entertainment Committee
- C. Field Trip Committee
- D. Nomenclature Committee
- E. Program Committee
- F. Projection Committee
- G. Publicity Committee

A. The A.A.P.G. Committee shall coordinate the efforts and activities of the Mississippi Geological Society, Inc. with the American Association of Petroleum Geologists. If any member or members of this Society is a District Representative or holds a National Office in the A.A.P.G., such members shall automatically serve on this committee.

B. The Entertainment Committee shall provide a suitable place for each meeting of the Society. If a luncheon or dinner is served in connection with the meeting, this Committee shall make all necessary arrangements including reservations. This Committee shall plan and coordinate any other social function of the Society.

C. The Field Trip Committee shall make and supervise the general plans of the field trips which may be held from time to time at the discretion of the Society. This Committee shall avail themselves of the services of any other Committee of the Society whenever it is necessary.

D. The Nomenclature Committee shall consist of a minimum of five members. Its membership shall include the First Vice President of the Society and whenever possible, one member of the Mississippi Oil Scouts Association. This Committee shall promptly name any new oil and/or gas fields, reservoirs, salt domes and any other geologic feature they deem advisable in the State of Mississippi. The Vice President will be responsible in seeing that all interested operators are contacted prior to the naming of any new discovery. After naming any new discovery in the state, the Committee shall immediately notify the Secretary of the Society and such publications and regulatory bodies as they deem necessary. The Secretary of the

Society will enter any new names in the minutes and announce them at the next meeting of the Society.

E. The Program Committee: The Program Committee shall secure speakers and lecturers to present topics of interest to the Society, shall make all necessary arrangements for presentation, and this Committee shall notify sufficiently in advance all other Committees whose services will be required to implement the meeting.

F. The Projection Committee shall provide and operate all projection and sound equipment necessary to any presentation before the Society.

G. The Publicity Committee, upon notification of the Chairman of the Program Committee, shall prepare and distribute to all members in advance notice of all meetings. This Committee shall as soon as practicable contact all new geologists in this area who are eligible for membership in the Society. This Committee shall secure as much favorable publicity as possible for the Society and the profession of geology.

#### **ARTICLE VIII—SPECIAL COMMITTEES**

The President shall appoint the Chairman of special committees and, after consultation with these Chairman, shall appoint the membership thereof. These special committees shall specifically include those with technical assignments designed to further the objectives of this Society as stated in Article II of the Constitution.

#### **ARTICLE IX—DUES AND ASSESSMENTS**

The annual dues of Active and Associate Members shall be determined by the Board of Directors at the end of each fiscal year. Any proposed increase in dues shall be presented for approval to the membership present at the last regular meeting of the fiscal year. Upon approval by a majority vote, the new dues shall become payable at the beginning of the following fiscal year which shall be from June 1st through May 31st.

#### **ARTICLE X—MEETING**

A. Regular Meetings: Regular meetings shall be held each month from October to May, inclusive. Regular meeting dates may be changed or cancelled at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

B. Special Meetings: Special meetings may be called from time to time to conduct business or for any other purpose deemed advisable by the Board of Directors, due notice having been given in advance.

#### **ARTICLE XI—AMENDMENTS**

Amendments to the Bylaws may be made by a two-thirds majority of the membership voting by mailed ballots, to be supplied and mailed by the Society to the membership, provided a motion to amend said Bylaws has been passed at a regular business meeting by a majority of the members present at said meeting. Returned ballots must be post marked within 30 days of the mail in order to be counted.

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

## PRESIDENT'S PAGE

I would like to start this message with a brief discussion of what has come to be at least a minor aggravation to most of the geologists here in Jackson and around the Gulf Coast... The inaccessibility of core and test data. How many times have you been working the logs in an area, and found that you needed to know what was in a particular core or recovered in a DST? If you were lucky, and the well was drilled, say prior to 1965, then all you had to do was look at the bottom of the log, and all the core descriptions and test data were neatly tabulated for you. If, however, the log is recent, then your quest for more knowledge would entail about a half-dozen phone calls to other operators who may or may not have the information; and then at least a week-long wait until they have the time to mail it to you. It would be of great benefit to all parties concerned if you, as an operator, would include a copy of your core descriptions, core analysis, and DST data with the well logs when they are released to the log services. It only takes a small extra effort, and you will appreciate it the next time you don't have to get on the phone to find a core.

Our next meeting is on March 9th, and the speaker is Travis Hughes, who will give his slide lecture and first hand account of the eruption of Mount St. Helens. From discussions with many of the members, I expect this talk to draw a record crowd. It is unlikely that we will be able to accommodate the anticipated crowd in the Smackover Room, so it is imperative that you make a reservation for this meeting. We will reserve space only for those who call in an advance reservation.



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UNIVERSITY

In order to compensate somewhat for decreasing Federal research funds I envisage establishing a contract service for stable isotope analyses at NIU. We have the capability of doing D/H,  $^{13}\text{C}/^{12}\text{C}$ ,  $^{18}\text{O}/^{16}\text{O}$ , and  $^{34}\text{S}/^{32}\text{S}$  analyses of high precision in a wide variety of materials including carbonates, silicates, sulfates, waters, and hydrocarbons. We are currently setting up a preparation system for paleotemperature determinations using microfossils. Since this system is designed to use very small samples, it may be of interest to oil researchers studying diagenetic processes that affect porosity of oil reservoir rocks. The service that we hope to set up is one in which we can have some of the fun of interpreting the results rather than just a facility for routine analytical determinations.

It may be of some interest that graduate students taking a course in stable isotopes (Geology 524) now get "hands on" instruction in stable isotope techniques. Since these techniques are becoming increasingly important in evaluating oil and gas fields, I think that a healthy stable isotope facility is important to those companies that employ our graduates. Incidentally, the central focus for the stable isotope laboratory at NIU is a partially automated MAT 250 mass spectrometer, probably the best commercially available instrument for stable isotope analysis.



Abstracts must be on the 1983 AAPG ABSTRACT FORM (original or a Xerox), must be typewritten, double-spaced and 500 words or less. The word limit will be strictly followed. Submit an original plus two copies. Receipt of the abstract will be acknowledged promptly to



the speaker's address. Notice of acceptance or non-acceptance will be mailed by November 15, 1982 to the speaker's address. "Speakers' Kits" or "Poster Kits" (with presentation schedules) will be mailed during early December to the speaker's address.

Accepted convention abstracts and any accompanying illustrations will


be published in a two-column format with the column width of 20 picas (3-5/16") in the March 1983 AAPG BULLETIN. Authors who wish to submit a single key illustration to be published with the written abstract may do so under the following guidelines:

- 1) the illustration must be simple, concise and capture the essence of the paper;
- 2) it must be clearly legible when reduced to single column size (20 picas); ideally, the original illustration should not exceed twice this width (40 picas or 6-5/8");
- 3) scales should include metric units;
- 4) the written abstract must be equally understandable with or without the illustration;
- 5) the illustration can include a brief title drafted in the body of the illustration, but cannot be captioned.

The Program Editorial Committee will determine if the illustration fits the guidelines for publishing, with the final decision to be made by the Managing Editor of the BULLETIN.

Technical program chairmen will carefully screen all submitted abstracts prior to their acceptance for suitability in accordance with the convention theme and the proposed session topics. Submitted papers which do not fit proposed topics may be considered for a "general" session. Topics proposed for the 1983 convention include:

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
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
