

A special meeting of the Mississippi Geological Society was held in the Edwards Hotel, Jackson, Mississippi, April 17, 1942. The meeting was called to order at 8:20 P. M. by President McGlothlin. Twenty-six were present.

President McGlothlin asked for expressions regarding the annual dance of the Society, and it was voted that the dance be at the Heidelberg Hotel roof on some week night, the date to be arranged by the Program Committee.

Dr. Ralph W. Imlay, with the U. S. G. S., Washington, D. C., gave a very interesting and enlightening talk on the Jurassic system of the Gulf area and compared it with the Jurassic of northern Mexico and Cuba. He emphasized that fossils are the keys in determining Jurassic formations, and he asks that anyone finding fossils in cores from Jurassic beds preserve and send the fossils to him at Washington, where they will be studied and filed for future reference. He told how fossil ammonites from Cuba show beds previously believed to be Lower Cretaceous are definitely Jurassic and that some 1300' of these beds in Cuba correlate with the Cotton

Valley formation of Arkansas and Louisiana. He also pointed out that presence of Jurassic section in the deep Clarke County, Alabama, test shows an eastward extension of Jurassic, probably across Florida.

MINUTES OF THE MISSISSIPPI GEOLOGICAL SOCIETY

A regular business meeting of the Mississippi Geological Society was held in the Edwards Hotel, Jackson, Mississippi, May 6, 1942. The meeting was called to order at 8:15 P. M. by President McGlothlin. Thirteen were present.

Purpose of the meeting was to review and discuss work on the project of publishing a revised Mississippi Geologic Map by the Society. Since Mr. Hughes, Chairman of the Map Committee, could not be present, the discussion was lead by President McGlothlin. A copy of John Doering's map of the south third of Mississippi has been made and was shown and discussed. Dave Harrell had a map showing their contacts worked in the east central and northeast parts of the state. Since there will undoubtedly be some difference in these contact lines as mapped by various men, it was decided we must wait until a number of maps are in before anything final can be posted; therefore, it is urged that all those having maps for posting their work should get them in as soon as possible.

The date of May 21st was set for the Annual Dance of the Society to be at the Heidelberg Hotel Roof. The secretary was instructed to mail cards to all members, asking them to make reservations with C. L. Morgan. A motion

was made and passed that the Program Committee be allowed to spend, if it is needed, up to \$30.00 for a room in the Hotel and refreshments for this night, to be paid by the Society.

Mr. Merril Harris commented on some of the speeches and views presented on the military service problem at the Denver A. A. P. G. Convention. He reported that A. A. P. G. past President, Ed Owen, is now a Captain in the Army and is on a campaign to obtain 1000 geologists for study of aerial photographs in war operations. Mr. Harris further mentioned that Mr. Owen reported that 2500 of the A. A. P. G. questionnaires were returned from a 3500 membership, and that they have now been classified and 500 geologists are classed as ready for military service. Also, Mr. Harris advised that Mr. Owen is visiting several cities, contacting men for military service. A motion was made and passed that the Society try to get Mr. Owen to Jackson for a talk to the Society.

During these comments and reports, there was considerable discussion as to how geologists may best serve their country, their family, their company, and themselves during this time of war.

MINUTES OF THE MISSISSIPPI GEOLOGICAL SOCIETY

A dinner and business meeting of the Mississippi Geological Society was held at the Edwards Hotel, Jackson, Mississippi, May 20, 1942. The meeting was called to order by President McGlothlin at 8:00 P. M. Twenty-seven were present.

Immediately following the dinner a short business session was held. Mr. Morgan, Chairman of the Program Committee, reported that he has been unable to make a definite appointment with Mr. Ed Owen for a talk to this Society but Mr. Owen advised this may be arranged at a later date.

The Secretary read a review of the finances of the Society for the period October 1, 1941, to May 20, 1942, and reported that as of May 20, 1942, the cash balance was \$450.54.

President McGlothlin reported that it will be necessary for Mr. Urban Hughes to be away from Jackson a great deal during the coming months, and Mr. Hughes had suggested appointing a new Chairman of the Map Committee. However, President McGlothlin is asking Mr. Hughes to continue working as Chairman of this Committee.

Mr. J. B. Storey, a member of the Program Committee, reported that if the Society wished to have one more meeting before the summer vacation period that Dr. Fisk of Louisiana State University would give a talk before the Society on the "Midway-Wilcox Deltaic Mass". Motion was made and passed that

we ask Dr. Fisk to give his paper at a meeting June 3, 1942.

Mr. Clyde Alexander of Phillips Petroleum Company, Shreveport, Louisiana, gave the talk of the evening. His subject was "Problems of Wilcox Production and Exploration". Mr. Alexander gave a very interesting and practical discussion of his subject and pointed out that the usual methods of drilling and coring to find oil sands are not satisfactory in the Wilcox formation in Central Louisiana. In this area the Wilcox is 3000 to 3200' thick, consisting of sand and shale, and all of the sands are possible oil or gas bearing. Since drilling changes are not sharp and the breaks between oil to water are thin, and the oil or gas sands are difficult to detect in samples, cores, and electrical logs, they have found the best procedure is to drill through about half of the Wilcox, then run electrical survey and sidewall core the interesting appearing places. After drilling the remaining Wilcox, the same procedure is followed, and casing is cemented below the expectant production horizon and is perforated, and cement is squeezed both above and below the pay zone, followed by perforating in the pay sand.

The meeting adjourned at 10:30 P. M.
