
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
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MGS BOLAND SCHOLARSHIP FUND

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Consultant: Gas glut to deflate prices for years

A supply glut resulting from the surge in shale gas production will result in "a prolonged period of significant weakness," with prices in the \$5 to \$6/MMBtu range for the next several years, said Jen Snyder, head of Wood Mackenzie North American Gas Research.

"We are now in a position of significant potential oversupply brought about by the huge success experienced in the development of shale gas plays," Snyder said in a newly released presentation from a Houston energy conference last week.

the marginal cost of the most expensive shale plays, we think this is a mistaken reading of the current and future environment," Snyder said. "Simply stated,

Weather, recession, Gulf recovery to drive 2009 prices, Denhardt says

Unless there is extremely cold weather worldwide, US gas prices are likely to average well below \$7/MMBtu during the year ahead, analyst Ron Denhardt in a report Monday.

Denhardt, vice president of natural gas services at Strategic Energy and Economic Research, maintained his 2009 average price outlook of \$6.40/MMBtu, predicting a range of around \$5/MMBtu to \$8/MMBtu. "Weather, the depth of the recession and the speed of recovery of production deferred in the Gulf [due to hurricanes] will be the major forces determining prices," the analyst said.

Over the next year, Denhardt expects a sharp decline in US gas consumption in the industrial and electric generation sectors due to the recession. At the same time, he expects US production to climb 3.6% next year and for world liquefied natural gas liquefaction capacity to grow by 7.5 Bcf/d.

Denhardt cautioned that if worldwide LNG demand slumps due to the economy and low oil prices, it could add to downward price pressure in the US.

Setting the floor on any price drop would be an increase in gas displacing coal for electric generation due to climate concerns, as well as any drilling slowdowns in response to low prices, he noted. — *Stephanie Seay*

there is no requirement for the rapid near- to midterm development of some of the more expensive or challenging shales such as the Marcellus or Horn River; the market can be adequately supplied without these volumes."

Snyder said there are "sufficient volumes available at a development break-even price of \$5.50/MMBtu or below for the market to balance."

Wood Mackenzie's conclusions through 2014 take into account the decline in demand due to a prolonged recession the firm expects will last through the fourth quarter of 2010, as well as new wind- and coal-fired capacity to serve

power loads and a significant drop in drilling in response to lower prices. Snyder also cited the potential of other factors not yet taken into account in

the market, such as "significant import volumes of liquefied natural gas over the

next few years, despite the recent growth in unconventionals."

She said that existing off-take arrangements for some suppliers make diversions from North America unlikely. And some exporters, the Qataris in particular, are likely to direct some of their new volumes to the US, "where there are no long-term contract implications and a large and liquid market to absorb the volumes."

Furthermore, the \$5-\$6/MMBtu price range is not a floor, Snyder stressed. While a severely cold winter could further tighten the market, a mild winter could exacerbate the current oversupply and lead prices into the \$4/MMBtu range in the near term, she said.

The price forecast also assumes a 1.5 Bcf/d switch from coal- to gas-fired power generation. "If this fails to materialize due to collapsing coal prices, this would further add to short-term price weakness." — *Stephanie Seay*
